The Mission of The Highground Veterans Memorial Park and Camp Victory is to Honor, Educate and Heal

The Vision of The Highground Veterans Memorial Park and Camp Victory is three-fold:

To Honor the sacrifices of Veterans, active service men and women and their families through our memorial park, camp and services.

To Educate the public about the services rendered, the hardships endured, the sacrifices made, and the human cost asked of and proudly paid for by our service men and women.

To Heal Veterans and their families by providing a park and camp as a place for fellowship, support and reflection.



The Highground is located in pristine Central Wisconsin on two breathtaking wooded campuses totaling approximately 450 acres. The Highground Veterans Memorial Park features 155 acres and is located three miles west of Neillsville, Wisconsin along Highway 10. Camp Victory is located approximately 18 miles north of The Highground.

The Highground pays tribute to Veterans of the past, present, and future. The beautiful grounds of The Highground and Camp Victory are maintained by a dedicated crew of more than 200 volunteers, many whom are Veterans. Annual visitors are on the rise with 225,000 last year alone. Of the approximately 7,000 visitors who are Veterans, many receive personalized support services while touring the tributes and memorials or participating in retreats and services.



Expanding The Highground for Generations

The Highground Veterans Memorial Park includes:

- More than 15 easily-accessible Tributes and four miles of scenic walking trails
- Honor Stones throughout the Park that honor Veterans' service including Korean Stones, Legacy Stones, Persian Gulf Stones, Military Working Dog Stones, United In Service Stones and Meditation Stones
- Camp Victory, a 295-acre camp, provides a quality outdoor experience for mobility-challenged individuals, Veterans, and their families
- A Museum containing over 4,000 books, a gallery for exhibits, and media and meeting rooms

- Offers an opportunity to honor Veterans by educating large tour and school groups

Going Above And Beyond

The stories of Veterans are etched in minds and hearts -- some to remain hidden forever. These are stories about heroes and heartache, honor and healing – but most of all, the stories are about HOPE. Over the last 35 years The Highground and Camp Victory have worked to honor Veterans, remember those who have died in service to our country, educate the next generation about the importance of Veteran sacrifice and create new ways to help returning service personnel heal and become whole again.

The Time Is Now

Expansion

Today The Highground and Camp Victory is the largest privately funded, continually-staffed Veterans memorial in the country. But the interest in The Highground is outweighing the organization's ability to respond to the demand for space and services.

That is why The Highground Board of Directors is seeking \$4M through The Highground Rising capital campaign. Campaign proceeds will pay off the \$450,000 mortgage, build a new \$2.5M Welcome and Visitor Center, provide \$500,000 to increase accessibility and park safety, and develop formal mental health and therapy or referral services.



A Moment of Grace

Grace comes to us in many forms. Grace came to a Vietnam Veteran through the plight of an American Bald Eagle that was injured and brought to the Antigo Raptor Rehabilitation Center in 2004 to regain its health.

After the eagle's rehabilitation, Bob Mingus, a Vietnam Veteran and former member of the 101st Airborne Screaming Eagles, was asked to participate in the eagle's release. Bob had carried many emotional burdens from his experiences in Vietnam. One was the death of Dean Bonneau, a very good friend, declared missing in action. Bob felt he should have been allowed to try to recover Dean's body. This lack of closure had weighed heavily on Bob for decades.



At the eagle's release, Bob's job was to give the bird lift as it found its wings. "In the moments before the release, the eagle seemed to know what was happening and relaxed in my arms," reflected Bob. "As I let go of the eagle and watched him fly majestically away, I felt a sense of peace I have never felt before. I was finally able to let go of some of the pain I felt from losing Dean."

This release of pain, guilt and memories in the most perfect location, is what transpires at The Highground for each Veteran — in their own way, every day.





Benefits of the Expansion

The expansion of The Highground and Camp Victory will take the organization to the next level. Improved services and facilities for Veterans and their families will provide the following:

- Increased financial stability and long-term sustainability with the pay-off of the \$450,000 mortgage

Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), ensuring access to the entire Park and all memorial sites for disabled Veterans and visitors

- A new 12,000 square-foot Welcome and Visitor Center, with space for larger events, meetings, and programs, as well as mental health services
- Improved parking, allowing for safer access to memorials and the Welcome and Visitor Center
